

Jimbo Fisher - Texas A&M

Lecture Title: Playing Football the Aggie Way

Jimbo Fisher, who led Florida State University to a national championship in 2013, was named head football coach at Texas A&M University on December 4, 2017. In his first season in

Aggieland (2018), Fisher led the Aggies to nine wins and a second-place finish in the SEC West, which was the program's best SEC finish since joining the league in 2012. The Aggies closed out the year with four straight wins including an epic 74-72 seven-overtime victory over LSU, the program's first win over the Tigers in more than 20 years. The bowl victory was a 52-13 win over North Carolina State in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl.

With COVID interrupting everything in 2020, Fisher went against an all-SEC regular season schedule to go 8-1, finished second in the SEC West, and earned a spot in the Capital One Orange Bowl against North Carolina. The Aggies won 41-27 and finished the year 9-1 and a final national ranking of No. 4 in both polls. It marked the highest finish for an Aggie football team since Texas A&M's 1939 National Championship team of 1939. Fisher was a finalist for the Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year.

Fisher brings an overall record of 109-33 (.768) into his 12th season as a collegiate head coach and a 26-10 (.722) ledger into his fourth campaign in Aggieland. Fisher has a 9-2 (.818) all-time bowl record including a 3-0 mark as the Aggies' head man.



Mike Elko - Texas A&M DC

Lecture Title: 3rd Down Defense

Veteran defensive coach Mike Elko is in his fourth season overseeing the Wrecking Crew as defensive coordinator. Elko has vastly improved the Aggie defense throughout his time in

College Station and saw the unit lead the SEC in total defense and rank second among league teams in rushing and passing defense. Elko's guidance helped A&M post an 8-1 regular season record against all SEC opponents and boast a top-five ranking through the end of the season.

Elko is a 1999 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania with a bachelor's degree in history. As a safety, he helped the Quakers to the 1998 lvy League title.

Mike and his wife Michelle, have three children, Michael, Andrew and Kaitlyn.



Pete Fredenburg – UMHB

Lecture Title: Defensive Line Play at UMHB

Pete Fredenburg has quickly built the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor football program into a national power after starting the program from scratch 23 years ago and he guided the Cru to its first National Championship in 2018. Fredenburg has led the Cru to a 216-39 overall record in his 22 seasons in Belton and has guided UMHB to 16 postseason berths. The Cru has won 16 American Southwest Conference championships under Fredenburg's direction, including one this spring to cap another undefeated season. UMHB has advanced to at least the Second

Round of the postseason every year since 2004 and has played in eight National Semifinal games. Fredenburg has guided the Cru to a 34-15 postseason record in his tenure. Fredenburg is a ten-time AFCA Region III Coach of the Year and is also a ten-time ASC Coach of the Year. He was named AFCA Division III National Coach of the Year after the 2016 season and he also earned Liberty Mutual Division III National Coach of the Year honors following the 2013 season. Fredenburg was also named American Football Monthly Division III Coach of the Year honors that year. Fredenburg was elected to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in the fall of 2017 and was officially enshrined in the hall at a ceremony in April of 2018.

Fredenburg was an assistant coach at Baylor University from 1980 to 1993 under legendary coach Grant Teaff and he coached the Bears in the Cotton. Liberty, Copper, John Hancock and Bluebonnet Bowls in that time. He was named Southwest Conference Defensive Coach of the Year in 1990. Fredenburg also spent one season at Louisiana State University and three seasons as defensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech before joining UMHB. Fredenburg is a 1970 graduate of Southwest Texas State and he was a three-year letterman for the Bobcats football team. He started his coaching career at New Braunfels Canyon High School before moving to New Braunfels High. He was head coach at Giddings High School for three seasons before moving to Baylor. Coach Fredenburg and his wife, Karen, have three children and nine grandchildren. His youngest son, Cody, was a four-year starter at quarterback for UMHB and was a 2003 Gagliardi Trophy Finalist. Cody also served as the Cru's offensive coordinator during a four-year stint as an assistant coach at his alma mater.



Gary Patterson - TCU

Lecture Title: TCU Drills

Since taking over the helm of the Horned Frogs in December 2000, Gary Patterson is synonymous with TCU football and Fort Worth.

Patterson, the Horned Frogs' all-time winningest coach with 178 victories, has received 22 national coach of the year honors. His most recent accolade came

when he was selected as the 2018 recipient of the Gene Stallings Award.

Patterson led TCU to a 2014 Big 12 championship, in just its third season in the conference, and a 2017 Big 12 Championship Game appearance. TCU has won six conference titles, in three different leagues, under Patterson. He has also been the coach of the year in each conference.

Patterson's .706 winning percentage (178-74) ranks fourth among active coaches nationally (minimum 10 years). Patterson is tied for second nationally among active FBS head coaches in most AP Top-10 finishes with six (2008, 2009, 2010, 2014, 2015, 2017). He's also second among active head coaches in most top-25 finishes with 11.

Patterson became TCU's career leader in wins with a 56-0 victory over Grambling State in the 2012 season opener, a game that also marked the debut of the rebuilt Amon G. Carter Stadium. The previous TCU mark of 109 wins was held by Dutch Meyer (1934-52).

As head coach, Patterson has coached 263 all-conference selections, 18 first-team All Americans, 22 Freshman All-Americans, two Academic All-Americans and a Rhodes Scholar. He has had 53 players drafted with a total of 129 in NFL camps.

Patterson's success on the gridiron is also mirrored in the classroom for his players. In eight of the last 11 seasons, TCU has been recognized by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) as one of the nation's leaders in its graduation rate for student-athletes.

Patterson's defensive acumen dates back to his own playing days at Kansas State, where he played strong safety and outside linebacker for the Wildcats in 1980 and 1981. He served as a student assistant in 1982 and received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1983. He took the linebacker coaching position at Tennessee Tech while earning a master's degree in educational administration in 1984.

A native of Rozel, Kansas, Patterson is married to the former Kelsey Hayes. He has three sons: Josh, Cade and Blake and three grandsons.



Steve Sarkisian - Univ. of Texas

Lecture Title: Forever Texas: Longhorn Football Culture

The 2020 Broyles Award winner (best assistant coach in college football) as offensive coordinator at Alabama, and the former head coach at USC and Washington, Steve Sarkisian was named the 31st

Head Football Coach at The University of Texas on January 2, 2021.

In the past two seasons as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks' coach at Alabama, Sarkisian was the architect of 24 straight games in which the Crimson Tide's offense scored 35 or more points, the longest streak in major college football history. Despite coming up just short of that in a 31-14 win over Notre Dame in the

College Football Playoff semifinals, the victory propelled Alabama to the National Championship Game where they defeated No. 3 Ohio State, 52-24.

Sarkisian not only boasts play-calling experience at the highest levels of football, but seven years as an FBS head coach. He guided the Southern California program in 2014-15, and the Washington Huskies from 2009-13. He posted a head coaching record of 46-35 over those seven seasons while leading his teams to five bowl appearances.

At USC, Sarkisian coached Heisman Trophy-winning quarterbacks in Palmer and Leinart, along with NFL signal-callers Mark Sanchez, John David Booty and Matt Cassel. The Trojans went 23-3 during his tenure as the offensive coordinator.

Prior to his start in coaching as quarterbacks' coach at El Camino College in 2000, Sarkisian starred at the quarterback position at the prep, collegiate and pro levels. He spent time with the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League for three seasons (1997-99) following his collegiate career at BYU.

While with the Cougars from 1995-96, He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996 and earned second team All-America honors. Sarkisian earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from BYU in 1997 after getting his associate degree in general studies from El Camino College in 1994. He is married to the former Loreal Smith, who competed and coached in track and field. He has two daughters, Ashley and Taylor, and a son, Brady.



Jeff Banks - Asst. HC/ Special Team Coord. - UT

Lecture Title: Texas Special Teams: Punt Return Organization Drills

A highly-regarded special teams coordinator who has extensive experience coaching in the state of Texas, Jeff Banks was named assistant head coach, special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Texas on January 22, 2021.

Banks comes to Texas after completing three seasons on Nick Saban's staff at Alabama working alongside Steve Sarkisian as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach during which time the Crimson Tide posted a 38-3 record, playing for two National Championships and winning one in 2020.

He spent the previous five years in the same role at Texas A&M (2013-17), and nine years as special teams coordinator and running backs coach at UTEP prior to that (2004-12) for a total of 14 in the state of Texas.

A native of Upland, Calif., Banks has a daughter, Sydnei, and two sons, Gage and Tanner. Banks earned his bachelor's degree in communications from Washington State in 1999.

Daniel Boedeker graduated from Shiner High School in 1992. He went on to earn his Bachelor of Science degree in Kinesiology from Sam Houston State University where he was a member of the Bearkat Baseball team from 1992-

1997. His first coaching job was at Dayton High School from 1997-1999. He then returned to Shiner High School as an assistant in football and baseball. He was part of the 2002 baseball State Championship. In 2002, he left to become an assistant football and baseball coach in Gonzales. In 2003 he returned to Shiner as the head baseball coach. In 2004 he was a part of the Baseball and Football State Championships. In 2015 he became the Defensive Coordinator for the Comanches and in 2019 was promoted to Athletic Director and Head Football Coach. The Comanches have compiled 26-1 record over that span and were the 2020 Class 2A State Champions. Daniel and his wife Nicole have been married for 23 years and have 3 children, Coy, Ty and Avery.

Jeff Traylor & Tommy Perry (ST) - UTSA Monday, July 19th - 9:00 AM - Stars at Night Ballroom B3-B4

Lecture Title: How to identify and Teach Special Team Role Players

Now in his second year as UTSA head coach, Jeff Traylor has had an immediate and positive impact on the program after guiding the Roadrunners to a 7-5 record, a runner-up finish in Conference USA's West Division and an appearance in the First Responder Bowl in his first season at the helm. Punter Lucas Dean, kicker Hunter Duplessis and running back Sincere McCormick all earned All-America accolades, while

a school-record 23 players received conference honors. The former associate head coach at Arkansas, SMU and Texas has more than 30 years of coaching experience, including a highly successful 15-year career as head coach at his alma mater, Gilmer High School, where he led teams to three state championships and two state runner-up finishes and won more than 87% of his games, a winning percentage that ranks 10th all-time in Texas high school history.



Justin Carrigan - UTPB

Lecture Title: Pre & Post Snap RPO's on 2nd and 3rd Level Defenders

Justin Carrigan enters his sixth season as the only head coach in the history of UT Permian Basin Football. In that time, Carrigan has been the architect of the team's rise culminating in a perfect 5-0 season in the spring of 2021.

The Falcons used an aerial attack this spring where they threw for 14 touchdown passes in just five games, including twice tying the program record in a single game. The team had major big play ability, none longer than Brayden Thomas' 99-yard strike to MJ Link to tie an NCAA record. The defense was also sensational,

allowing just 12.6 points per game. They forced 16 turnovers in their 5-0 season and set a team record with 12 interceptions.



Dave Aranda & Jeff Grimes (Off.) - Baylor Monday, July 19th – 10:00 AM – Stars at Night Ballroom B3-B4

Lecture Title: Building an Offensive System

A 2020 National Champion and 25-year coaching veteran, Dave Aranda was named the 28th head coach in Baylor Football history on Jan. 16, 2020.

Aranda (uh-RAN-duh) came to Waco after four seasons as associate head coach and defensive coordinator at LSU, including a 2020 National Championship and a 2019 SEC Championship. Widely considered one of the top defensive minds in all of football, Aranda has a track record of producing NFL-ready players.

Aranda spent five seasons in the state of Texas including a stint as linebackers coach at Houston (2003-04) and as a graduate assistant at Texas Tech (2000-02).

After he graduated from Redlands High School in California in 1994, numerous surgeries followed and ended his playing career. In 1995, he started his coaching resume at Redlands as an assistant coach. Aranda graduated from California Lutheran in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in philosophy. In 2002, he earned his master's degree in interdisciplinary studies at Texas Tech.

Aranda and his wife, Dione, have two daughters, Jaelyn and Jordyn, and a son, Ronin.



Matt Wells & Sonny Cumbie - Texas Tech

Lecture Title: QB Training and Drills

Matt Wells, a two-time conference Coach of the Year recipient, enters his third season at Texas Tech as he was named the 16th head football coach in school history on Nov. 29, 2018.

The 2021 season will be Wells' ninth season as a collegiate head coach as he has compiled a 52-48 overall record following six seasons at his alma mater, Utah State, and two years leading the Red Raiders. He led the Aggies to five bowl appearances during his tenure, a feat he will look to accomplish

frequently as he continues to build the Texas Tech program.

Wells, a quarterback for the Aggies from 1994-96, was a member of two conference championship teams as a student-athlete, which came as a redshirt freshman in 1993 and as a senior in 1996 when Utah State was a member of the Big West Conference.

The Aggies earned a share of the Big West title each of those two seasons, the first of which garnered Utah State an invite to the 1993 Las Vegas Bowl II. Utah State topped Ball State, 42-33, in that game for its first bowl victory in school history.

A native of Sallisaw, Oklahoma, Wells earned his bachelor's degree in business marketing from Utah State in 1996, graduating cum laude. He and his wife, Jen, have two daughters, Jadyn and Ella, and one son, Wyatt. In only their short time at Texas Tech, the Wells family has contributed significantly to the Lubbock community through local non-profit organizations such as Voice for Hope and Women's Protective Services through his Women's Football Clinic as well as the South Plains COVID-19 Relief Fund.



Gary Joseph - Katy HS

Lecture Title: Winning Up Front

Coach Joseph began his coaching career at Luling High School. After advancing in jobs at Brazosport and Austin Westlake, he then

moved to Katy High School where he has served for thirty-nine years. He was the KHS defensive coordinator and then assistant head coach, helping the Tigers win three state championships in five final appearances, before becoming the KHS head coach in 2004.

During his 17-year tenure as head coach, the Katy Tigers have made it to the state championship game nine times, winning five state championships (2007, 2008, 2012, 2015, 2020) while also winning 15 district championships in seventeen years; Joseph's record is currently 228-22.

Coach Joseph is part of the 2016 inductees into the Texas High School Sports Hall of Fame. Coach Joseph has been honored by the Katy Chamber of Commerce as Katy's 2007 Citizen of the Year and in 2010 was named one of Houston's Top 100 Professionals. In 2012 he was voted into the Greater Houston Football Coaches' Association Ronnie Bell Hall of Honor. In 2019 he was a national finalist for Power of Influence Award from the American Football Coaches Association. In 2020, he received the Tom Landry Award acknowledging outstanding contributions to the game of football by a Texas high school coach.

Coach Joseph has served on the Board of Directors of the THSCA, the GHFCA, and on the coaching staff of five prestigious all-star games, including the 2009 THSCA game where he served as the head coach for the South All Stars. Most importantly in 2017 and 2018 he served as President of the prestigious Texas High School Coaches Association and received the 2018 UIL Sponsor Excellence Award. He has spoken about Katy Football and its impact on our kids at many clinics throughout the state and nation.

For the Joseph family, football is a true tradition. Coach Joseph's father, Eddie Joseph, led a successful coaching career at Wharton High School and later became executive vice president of Texas High School

Coaches Association. Coach Joseph and his wife of 41 years, Sheila, have three children, all of who have also followed in their father's and grandfather's footsteps. Their son, Jon, has a degree in education and lives Sonora, TX; son Jeff is the LBer coach at Southlake Carroll, and their daughter, Julie, has coached at several schools in Texas, while her husband Eman Naghavi, a former KHS football player, coaches O Line at Georgia State University. Julie and Eman are parents to the Joseph's three granddaughters, Austin Ann, Ryan Reece, and Mason Marie. The Josephs are members of St. Bartholomew Catholic Church, where Gary has served as a lector and EOM for over thirty-five years.



Reginald Samples - Duncanville HS

Lecture Title: Duncanville ISD Strength & Conditioning - Player Development

Duncanville High School Head Football Coach Reginald Samples is on the verge of celebrating his 300th career win. His record speaks for itself - Coach Samples creates a winning culture wherever he goes. In his six years at Duncanville ISD, Coach Samples' football teams have amassed a record of 63 wins and 16 losses. Two back-to-back seasons culminated in a bid for the state championship. Prior to arriving in Duncanville, Coach Samples served as head football coach for 25 years in the Dallas Independent School district including nine years at Skyline High School. During Samples' time there, the Skyline football team participated in the state playoffs every year accumulating 19

playoff wins in six seasons. The Skyline football team won six straight district titles. During his distinguished 33 years coaching career, Coach Samples has received numerous awards and recognitions. The most prestigious of those came in 2019 when USA Today named him its ALL-USA Football Coach of the Year.



Sonny Dykes & Jim Leavitt (Def.) – SMU

Lecture Title: Defensive Fundamentals of SMU Football

In just three seasons on the Hilltop, Sonny Dykes has transformed SMU Football into a conference championship contender and launched the Mustangs into the Top 25. Dykes arrived on the Hilltop in December 2017 after head coaching stints at Louisiana Tech and Cal. At La. Tech, Dykes led the Bulldogs to a Western Athletic Conference title – the school's first league championship in a decade – and a berth in the Poinsettia Bowl. For his work, Dykes was named the WAC

Coach of the Year. At Cal, Dykes returned the school's football program to national prominence and a post-

season bowl game. Dykes has been a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award the Paul "Bear" Bryant Award. Dykes, the son of former longtime Texas Tech coach Spike Dykes, boasts a resume that also includes stops in the Big 12 and SEC. Dykes spent time in the Texas high school football ranks as well, serving as football assistant at Richardson's J.J. Pearce High School in 1995. Born in Big Spring, Texas, Dykes received his bachelor's degree in history from Texas Tech in 1993 and was a member of the Red Raider baseball team for two seasons. He is married to the former Kate Golding and they have two daughters, Alta (Ally) and Charlotte (Charlie), and a son, Daniel.



Mike Bloomgren & Chris Monfiletto (ST) – Rice Monday, July 19th – 12:00 AM – Stars at Night Ballroom B1 – B2

Lecture Title: Enhancing Offensive and Defensive Skills and Football 101 Through Special Teams

Dunlevie Family Head Football Coach Mike Bloomgren enters his third season at Rice looking to build on the momentum of three consecutive wins to close 2019 and a highly successful recruiting effort that saw the Owls sign their highest rated class according to one ranking service.

Bloomgren was named the 19th head football coach at Rice University on December 6, 2017 and immediately turned his focus on instilling the culture of "Intellectual Brutality" that he first conceived while on the staff at Stanford.

Part of that effort involved broadening the Owls search for talent to a national scale and in his 2020 team will feature players from 19 states, compared with just six on the roster he inherited. His efforts have also seen the Owls add eight JUCO recruits as well as 13 graduate transfers in his first three years.

Bloomgren came to Rice after seven seasons with the Cardinal, first as the offensive line coach (2011-12) and then assuming the reigns of Stanford's pro style offensive attack in 2013, setting the stage for one of the most successful decades in the program's rich history. Stanford has won eight or more games in each of his seasons and reached the Pac-12 Football Championship four times, winning three titles.

Prior to 2017, Bloomgren had coached 12 NFL Draft selections and 11 All-America selections at Stanford, including 2015 Outland Trophy winner Joshua Garnett and NCAA all-purpose yardage record holder Christian McCaffrey.

A native of Tallahassee, Florida, Mike and his wife, Lara, have two sons, Tyler and Parker.



Carlos Lynn - Cedar Hill HS

Lecture Title: Keep Growing!

Coach Carlos Lynn is starting his 26th year in coaching. His first 3 years he served as a speech teacher and coach at Wilmer-Hutchins High School in Dallas, TX. His last year there he was the Offensive Coordinator. He then moved on to Cedar Hill High School in 1998. He was the Defensive Line Coach until 2003 when he was elevated to

Defensive Coordinator. He served in that capacity until 2008. Coach Lynn has served as head football coach at Arlington Seguin for 9 years. Lynn is now entering his 5th year as the Head Coach of the Cedar Hill Longhorns. He led the Longhorns to the 2020 6A Division 2 State Finals.

Coach Lynn graduated from Wilmer-Hutchins High School in 1991, 8th in his class. He was the team captain of the 1990 4A State Championship team at Wilmer-Hutchins. He received a football scholarship to East Central University. While at East Central he was a part of the 1992 Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference Championship Team and the 1993 N.A.I.A. Division 1 National Championship Team. Also, in 2006 he coordinated the Cedar Hill defense to a 16-0 record en route to the 5A Division 2 State Championship. Coach Lynn took a 1-9 program at Seguin and turned it into a well-respected playoff team. He has been involved in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes for over 20 years. In 2013, he was awarded the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Huddle Leader of the Year.

Coach Lynn is an ordained deacon of the Church at the Inspiring Body of Christ Church (IBOC) in Dallas, TX where the Pastor is Rickie Rush. He is also a motivational speaker and team builder. He is a devoted husband of 22 years to Antwanette Lynn. They have a 17-year-old son named Caleb a two-time cancer survivor.



Dave Henigan Denton Ryan HS

Lecture Title: Denton Ryan Offense: Less is More

In seven years as Head Coach at Ryan Coach Henigan has helped lead the Raiders to six straight undefeated regular seasons, six straight District Championships, a class 6A State Quarterfinal appearance, three class 5A State Semifinal appearances, a class 5A State Finals appearance, a class 5A State Championship and an 85-5 record the last six years. At Ryan, Coach Henigan has been named the District Coach of the Year six straight years. He was also named the Dallas Morning News Coach of the Year in

2019. In 2020, he was named the Tom Landry Coach of the Year, TSWA Class 5A Coach of the Year, and the National Football Foundation of Dallas Coach of the Year. As Offensive Coordinator at Denton Ryan, he helped lead the Raiders to a state title in 2002 and a state runner-up in 2003. He has been married to his wife Laurie for 24 years. She is a second grade teacher. He has three sons, Ian (20), Seth (18), and Quin (13).

Lecture Title: Ole Miss Offensive Philosophy and QB Development

Jeff Lebby was announced as Ole Miss' offensive coordinator on Dec. 12, 2019 after spending his prior two seasons at UCF.

Lebby joined the Knights in December 2017 as quarterbacks coach before being promoted to offensive coordinator prior to the start of the 2019 season.

Lebby found immediate success in his first season in 2018, helping lead the Knights to their second straight undefeated regular season, another American

Athletic Conference Championship, a berth in the 2019 Fiesta Bowl and a national ranking as high as seventh.

He tutored McKenzie Milton, who threw for 2,662 yards and 25 touchdowns on his way to his second American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year honor. Milton finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy voting.

Lebby came to Orlando (2017) after one season as offensive coordinator at Southeastern University in Lakeland, Florida. He helped lead Southeastern to a 5-0 conference mark and a berth in the NAIA playoffs. Southeastern had the No. 1 scoring offense and the No. 3 total offense in the NAIA in 2017.

Prior to joining the Southeastern staff, Lebby served in various capacities on the football staff at Baylor. He was the passing game coordinator and offensive recruiting coordinator for two years. He coached the running backs for five years. Prior to those roles, Lebby was the assistant director of football operations in charge of offensive quality control, while also serving as the team's liaison to the NFL.

Prior to his tenure at Baylor, Lebby served as the offensive line/tight ends coach at Victoria Memorial (Texas) High School. Lebby played high school football for his father Mike Lebby at Andrews (Texas) High and earned all-state honors as a senior. He signed with Oklahoma, but an injury ended his playing career. He then spent four years with the Sooners as a student assistant coach.

Lebby earned a bachelor's degree from Oklahoma in 2007. He is married to the former Staley Briles. The couple has a daughter, Kora, and one son, Kane

The University of North Texas named Seth Littrell as its 19th head football coach, University President Neal Smatresk on December 5, 2015. Littrell, now 42, at North Texas through his first

five seasons, with four bowl appearances and one conference championship game appearance. Littrell's 31 wins at North Texas are sixth-most in program history.

Littrell has coached in 11 bowl games, played in two and was team captain on Oklahoma's 2000 national championship team. He was a four-year letter winner at Oklahoma where he rushed for 231 yards and seven touchdowns in 1999 and finished his career with 11 rushing scores. The Muskogee native graduated from Oklahoma with a degree in communications in 2001.
